A HEALTHY MINDED CONGREGATION

About two weeks ago Ruby, myself and one of our members spent two whole days in Orange County (Saddleback Church) at a workshop about mental health challenges in church ministry. The very next week another member and I went to a collaborative meeting of community helpers here in Moreno Valley where I was surprised that the excellent presentation on mental health taught many of the insights we had studied at Saddleback. Diagnosing and treating mental health issues and needs is changing for the better and is becoming very important in church ministry.

It occurs to me that not only individuals but also congregations have a mentality. This shared mentality or mind-set that develops during years of shared experiences can be healthy or unhealthy. Many churches develop DEPRESSION and a few even become suicidal. Congregations can become PARANOID -- suspicious, fearful or hostile toward anything different "out there." Churches can suffer SCHIZOPHRENIA developing conflicting personalities that fight and compete for control. Or how about BI-POLAR--unrealistic excitement followed by deep discouragement.


THE GOOD NEWS is that church mentality is treatable. The Gospel message that God really loves us unconditionally develops healthy thinking and healthy relationships. Loving listening and Christ-like sharing can heal hurts and fears and change actions. Individual mental illness is very treatable with the right diagnosis and medicine and therapy. Congregation mentality can also be treated by honesty, forgiveness, listening, understanding and supporting and caring based on the healing love of Jesus.

I ask each of you to join me in working together for a really healthy congregation. Jesus spent much of His ministry healing mental illness. His love has healing for our individual minds and our congregation mentality.

I invite you to think about this, pray about it, and the speak and work with each other.

They will take a well-deserved break in November and December and will return on the fourth Saturday in January. Please consider joining the group.






Start collecting items to put in them - small toys, school supplies, hygiene items, accessories, etc - a list of suggested items is included on the instruction sheet.

The New Reformation

In a little less than two years, we will be celebrating the 500th anniversary of the reformation. It's the anniversary of Martin Luther nailing the Ninety-Five Theses to the door of All Saints Church in Wittenberg. This was Martin Luther's bold, brash message to the church that its teachings had gone astray from the central message of forgiveness through placing ones trust in Christ.

As we approach this historic milestone, there is another reformation movement afoot in our own time. The movement is being led by a young man named Matthew Vines, and as Greg Koukle so aptly points out, it's a reformation the church doesn't need.

You may have never heard of Matthew Vines. He released a YouTube video a few years ago stating that he was an openly gay Christian, and believed the Bible and God affirmed rather than condoned his sexual orientation. Unlike other gay activists, Matthew attempts to show that the Bible is actually gay affirming, and assembled a team of scholars to argue for his position. He has started the reformation project, and is training other gay and straight allies to take their message into churches to try and change the stance of those who are still following Biblical teaching on the issue of homosexuality. I give him credit for his approach. Rather than simply dismissing the Bible, he attempts to engage the arguments and offer a refutation of the relevant passages. I'd like to take a look at some of his arguments and offer some rebuttals to them. Space prevents me from answering all his challenges, so I will deal with the ones I think you are most likely to encounter. For a more in depth response to his challenges, I recommend Stand to Reason's "Answering Matthew Vines's 40 Questions" and "Solid Ground; A Reformation the Church Doesn't Need," which can be found on the Stand to Reason web site at STR.org.

Sodom and Gomorrah:

The Reformation project claims that the sin for which Sodom and Gomorrah was judged was not homosexuality, but the attempted gang rape of angelic beings. They also claim that "The Bible explicitly condemns Sodom for its arrogance, inhospitality, and apathy toward the poor, but never for same-sex behavior." I think there are several problems with this line of thinking. First, there was no rape of the angels, only an attempt to do so. This new view would mean that God destroyed two entire cities for an attempted rape that never occurred. Secondly, God had already judged Sodom and Gomorrah (reference Genesis 19:13) prior to the angels visit, so it seems improbable that any event that happened that night was the cause of God's judgement. Lastly, New Testament passages in 2 Peter (2:6) and Jude (1:7) tell us that the sin was ongoing and sensual in nature. The only characteristic of the actions of the mob that night that fits this description is their homosexuality.

Romans 1:20-28

The Reformation project claims that this passage written by Paul is talking about abusive same sex relationships, not the loving, committed same sex unions we see today. The thing I find interesting about this passage is that Paul is making an appeal to the natural order of things. He's talking about the design of the human body, and how men and women are naturally designed for sex with one another. This is something that should be obvious to even those who do not believe in the truth of scripture. Even on a Darwinian evolutionary world view, it is an obvious fact how male and female bodies are designed for procreation. The point of the passage is the giving up of the function of sex. To quote Greg Koukle "Paul is not talking about natural desires here; he is talking about natural functions. He's talking about plumbing. He is not talking about what one wants sexually or the nature of the sexual relationship (abusive, exploitive, unloving, etc.), but how human beings are built to operate."

I hope this helps you in your discussions on this issue. Again, these are sensitive subjects to debate. I think we need to be prepared for the fact that no matter how graciously we may present our case, we will still be called names and dismissed out of hand by many in the culture today. We are called to be salt and light, and we need to present the truth with as much love and respect as we can. But we can't back away from the truth simply to gain acceptance from a hostile culture. I will be taking a break from this series on sex and culture for the December newsletter, and will resume again in January discussing transgenderism. Thanks so much for reading this, and I'll see you next month!

2015 FLOWER CHART




