THE EASTER SUNDAY NIGHT SERVICE



Relax! I'm not announcing or even suggesting an evening service on Easter Sunday, although there is Biblical precedence for it. On the very first Easter Sunday evening, Jesus met with His disciples, celebrated His resurrection and even shared the peace! [Luke 24:36-49 and John 20:19 -23] He confirms His resurrection to the disciples by appearing before them, showing them His crucifixion scars and demonstrating to them that it was truly Him and not some ghost by inviting them to touch Him and eating a piece of fish before them. What truly grabs my attention is what

He says and does next. He told them that now, "repentance and forgiveness of sins will be preached in His name to all nations." "He breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven." It's as if Jesus couldn't wait to tell them that because He had fulfilled everything in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms that were written about Him, now all sin was paid for and could be forgiven in His name. They were forgiven! They were to go out as witnesses of these things and pronounce forgiveness in His victory and atonement.

Think of it, Jesus' first words to His disciples following His resurrection were to go and preach repentance and forgiveness in His name. The fruit of Jesus' victory over sin, death and the grave, were forgiveness and life. Of course this wasn't the first time Jesus taught and urged His disciples to be forgiving toward one another. In the model and pattern for prayer that He taught, The Lord's Prayer, He spoke of being forgiven as well as being those who likewise forgive. In the Gospel of Matthew He further emphasizes the importance of forgiveness directly following His prayer: "For if you forgive men when they sin against you, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their sins, your Father will not forgive your sins." [Matthew 6:14-15] Thanks be to our risen Lord for the forgiveness, life and salvation He has won for us on the cross and in the empty tomb! May His undeserved grace and favor also move us to heed His calling to pronounce and preach forgiveness.

Sadly, all to often, we may think of forgiveness as a one way street where we receive the wondrous blessing from our Lord, but fail to see that we are to give witness of His forgiving love as we forgive others. Rather than proclaim love and forgiveness we pronounce judgment and hold resentment. Now, I know of nowhere in the Bible where God has conferred upon His followers the authority to judge. In that Easter Sunday night service He conferred upon His disciples (and the church) the power to forgive penitent sinners and the duty to not forgive those who are impenitent. This is not an appointment to be a judge. Quite the opposite, it is a calling to minister to all people: Penitent - those sorry for their sins; Impenitent - those who are not sorry and repentant of their sins. Jesus paid for the sins of all people and wants all to be saved through faith and forgiveness.

As Jesus' disciples today, as His church, we must share the joy and hope of the forgiveness of sins that we will celebrate in a couple of weeks on Easter Sunday: <u>1.</u> We are compelled to forgive others as Jesus has forgiven us. We will never have to forgive anyone more than what Jesus has already forgiven us. <u>2.</u> We must forgive others (or be willing to forgive) because the alternative is bitter resentment. "Be careful that none of you fails to respond to the grace which God gives, for if he does there can very easily spring up in him a bitter spirit which is not only bad in itself but can also poison the lives of many others." [Hebrews 12:15 Phillips] <u>3.</u> We must forgive others because that is God's will and expectation of His followers. If we withhold God's grace and mercy from others which we have received, how can we expect to be forgiven ourselves?

In his book, <u>They Like Jesus, But Not the Church</u>, Dan Kimball shares some responses from people that he asked what they wished churches would be like. <u>One of the responses was that the church would be a more loving place</u>. It caught my attention because one would certainly hope that if there were any place where someone could experience love, care and forgiveness, it would be in the church. Ironically, this probably does not surprise many of you. It doesn't surprise me either, sadly, because I have seen how church members have treated one another, how they have treated me, <u>AND</u> how I have treated them. I can't imagine what conclusions non-church members might come to about Jesus and His church with this kind of testimony. I can say that I am ashamed and ask for your forgiveness when I have been less than loving, caring and forgiving. I'd like to make this upcoming Easter season a time for reconciliation and for-giveness as a congregation. Let's take the powerful message of the cross and the hope of the empty tomb with us, incorporating it into our everyday lives in our church, our community and our families. Let's become living Easter celebrations! If that means having a special Easter Sunday night service to commemorate our calling to be forgiving disciples to all nations . . . Amen! Perhaps this much at least: On April 20th, Easter Sunday evening, after all the festive services have concluded and the Easter Breakfast is cleaned up; after families and friends have gathered for dinner and all the Easter baskets have been found – pause for a time of prayer to praise the Lord for His grace and forgiveness, to ask for His forgiveness when we have sinned, and for a loving heart of forgiveness toward others.

Hello again friends! Last month I gave you a brief history of the Jehovah's Witnesses, along with an introduction into their theology and beliefs. This month I would like to offer some strategies for interacting with the JW's, and offer some practical tips to help you defend your beliefs.

A good place to start your conversation is to discuss Jesus himself. The Watchtower Society denies the deity of Jesus, but to do this, they have to ignore what scripture says about Jesus. Jesus claimed to be God. He used the name of God (I Am), said He and God were one, and stated He and the Father were one. Jesus had the nature of God. He knew all, had the power to heal, knew future events and had control over the natural world. He was also worshiped as God. One of the best examples of this is in John 20:28, when Thomas sees the risen Jesus. His response is to state "My Lord and My God!" All this would seem good evidence that Jesus was in fact God. So how do JW's get around this? They make the problem go away by changing what scripture actually says.

As I pointed out last month, The Watchtower Society has made several significant changes to the text of the Bible in the New World Translation. I think it is fair to ask why they feel it necessary to make obvious changes to scripture that are not supported by the manuscript evidence available to us. Changes to passages such as John 1:1, where they insert an "a" so that it reads "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was <u>a</u>God." You can see how the insertion of this one letter changes the meaning of the passage. I own a Bible study program for my computer. In it, I can compare over 30 different translations of the Bible. None of them render the text with the "a" inserted. In fact, no other translation ever produced added the "a", with the lone exception of the New World Translation. How can we trust an organization that feels it necessary to make unsupported changes to a text simply to support its own errant theology?

The Jehovah's Witnesses make much of the 144,000 mentioned in Revelation Chapters 7 and 14 as the only members of the "Anointed Class." According to their teaching, Charles Russell and his Bible study group, as well as first century believers and a few "witness-like" believers are guaranteed to be in this group. But if we look at what the group described in Revelation actually consists of, it is radically different from what the Watchtower claims. The 144,000 are described as Jewish male virgins. If we hold to scripture, Charles Russell (who was married and assuredly not a virgin), the female members of his Bible study, and any non-Jewish member would not be in the 144,000. Often the JW will try and state that the description given about the 144,000 is simply figurative. But if the description is figurative, why can't the number in the same passage be considered figurative as well? It would seem that again, scripture is at odds with Watchtower teachings.

The final problem I will address facing the Jehovah's Witnesses is one of authority. As Lutherans, we recognize the authority of the Bible. But JW's go a step further. Not only is the authority of the Bible recognized, but the authority of the Watchtower Society as well. In fact, as I pointed out last month, it is their belief that you cannot be saved outside of their organization. As we have seen, other groups make this claim as well (i.e. The Catholic Church, The Mormons). But the Watchtower Society has a long track record of unfulfilled or incorrect prophecies (see last month's article for a detailed list). According to Deuteronomy 18:20-22, anyone making false prophesy is not to be listened to. The New World Translation has not altered the text of this passage, so you can point it out to them in their own Bible. If they hold to the authority of scripture, does it not teach that we should ignore the teachings of the Watchtower Society based on the false prophesies it has made over its long history?

I hope this series has been helpful to you. I have certainly learned a lot by researching and writing it! If you have found any other effective strategies that have worked for you in the past, please feel free to let me know. I always enjoy talking to you all about different ideas and approaches to witnessing. Next month I will offer a quick strategy to defend the resurrection of Jesus, known as "The Minimal Facts Approach" which was popularized by Gary Habermas and Michael Licona. See you next month!

Minimal Facts about the Resurrection

Hello and welcome again! In keeping with the Easter season, I would like to spend this time talking about, appropriately enough, the resurrection. Jesus rising from the dead is central to Christianity. Indeed, Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 15:19 that if Christ is not raised from the dead, we are to be pitied! If it were proved that Jesus was not raised, it would be a deal killer for our convictions. People have tried to come up with alternate explanations for the resurrection from the first days following it right up to today. And predictably, Easter is open season on attacks against the historicity of the risen Christ.

Happily for us, there are some brilliant scholars working on defending the historicity of the Resurrection. Dr. Gary Habermas and Dr. Michael Licona have written an excellent book titled "The Case for the Resurrection of Jesus." In it, they use what is described as the "minimal facts approach" to the resurrection of Jesus. The facts they site in the book are granted by nearly all Biblical scholars, even skeptical ones. After listing the facts, the authors explore several different theories of the resurrection to see which one fits the facts best.

So what are the facts that nearly all scholars recognize about the resurrection? First, Jesus died on a Roman cross. Second, the disciples had an experience in which they believed they saw Jesus raised from the dead, and it changed their lives. Third, the church persecutor Paul had an experience that changed him from being an enemy of the church to its greatest champion after having an experience with Jesus. Fourth, Jesus' brother James was transformed from a non-believer into the leader of the Jerusalem church after he believed he saw the risen Jesus. And lastly, the tomb was empty. While space does not permit me to do so, all these facts are described and attested to not only in the New Testament, but also in outside sources hostile to Christianity.

Now that we have our facts, we can look at some alternate theories and see if they fit the facts. Suppose for instance that the disciples actually stole the body from the tomb, and Jesus didn't rise. That might explain the empty tomb, but it wouldn't explain how Paul and James were transformed, as they had separate experiences of Jesus. Also, the disciples would have known they were spreading a lie about Jesus rising from the dead. None of them benefited from this deception if it occurred. Instead, they were beaten, tortured and killed. It seems if they were lying, at least one of them would have fessed up under such persecution.

What if someone else stole the body? First, who would have done this? Surely not the Romans or the Jews. If they had the body of Jesus, they would have produced it to stop the spread of the wild tales of him rising from the dead. What if someone unknown took the body? That might explain the empty tomb, but we still have the problem of Paul and James having different experiences at different times of the risen Jesus. It is also unlikely simply a missing body would be enough to convince the disciples that were cowering in the upper room to go out boldly and proclaim a risen Christ.

Suppose this was just a delusion brought on by grief, or a hallucination. Could the disciple's grief and longing for Jesus have actually caused them to believe he was alive when he wasn't? While this is possible, it doesn't explain the empty tomb. Again, all the Jewish leaders would have had to do was to produce Jesus' body, and it would have stopped the disciple's cold. In addition, Paul was not in a mindset that would have him wishing Jesus was alive. The problem with the hallucination theory is that hallucinations are not a group phenomenon. Hallucinations are individual events, and groups do not have hallucinations of the same things.

These are just a few of the common alternate theories to the resurrection of Jesus. There are more, but none of them fit the facts as well as the truth that Jesus actually rose from the dead. There is a flaw to this conclusion as well though. To make our theory work, you have to believe in the supernatural. This is a step many are unwilling to take, and it prevents them from accepting the conclusion that Jesus actually rose, even when it is the best explanation of the facts as presented.

I hope this article encourages you in this Easter season, and fills you with the confidence that we serve the risen Jesus. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
