"REMAINING LEVEL HEADED IN SPITE OF THE 'LEAVEN"

"Who stopped you from being influenced by the truth? The arguments of the person who is influencing you do not come from the one who is calling you. A little yeast spreads through the whole batch of dough. The Lord gives me confidence that you will not disagree with this. However the one who is

confusing you will suffer God's judgment regardless of who he is." Galatians 5:7-10 God's Word

In his letter to the Galatians, the Apostle Paul was addressing attacks on his authority as an Apostle of Jesus and attacks on the truth of the Gospel proclaiming that one is saved by faith alone. In Chapter 5, verses 7 through 10, he notes the metaphor of yeast and dough, and applies it to the pervasive effect of the Judaizaers' persuasive distortion of the truth of the Gospel. They were leading the Christians in the Galatian church from the freedom of grace in the Gospel to judgement under the Law. For example, they were insisting that circumcision was still obligatory and necessary for salvation. Paul, in an earthy and sarcastic tone suggests that the agitators who promoted such an offense would go the whole way and emasculate themselves! (5:12). The danger, as highlighted in the above verses, is that the false and evil "leaven" can permeate and work through the whole batch of dough. The false teaching and distortions of the truth of only a few, can hurt the whole church! A few verses later Paul adds, "If you keep on biting and devouring each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other." (5:15).

While the anonymous letter that went out to the members of the congregation on June 20th was not an attack on the Gospel, nor on the authority of the Office of the Public Ministry, it was an attack on me that was misleading, inaccurate and extremely distorted. As one of the many members who have contacted me to express their support in light of this malicious attack called it, 'Hogwash!' I am very thankful to all for their support and encouragement. But, I am equally concerned for the welfare of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church. We cannot let the "leaven" (yeast) of a few, hurt the congregation as a whole or distract us from our work together as God's church. As another member of Shepherd shared with me, we need to keep our focus on Jesus. When we are distracted, as was Peter by the "wind and the waves," we will sink! We cannot let this happen.

Brothers and Sisters, I am far from perfect. I am not the most capable and talented pastor ever to serve in God's church. Contrary to what some think, I do care about each and every member of Shepherd of the Valley. I forgive those who have attacked me and seek my removal. I don't agree with most of their allegations against me, but I share their frustration and concern regarding our church and ministry. No one is more troubled than I about the decline in Sunday attendance and the number of youth in our congregation. I pray about it daily. I am deeply hurt when I hear of the gossip about me and my family going around the church. I was truly injured when this anonymous letter came out, and the other one that was sent to the St. Louis church headquarters. But I'm healing, thanks to the many supporters in our church and the Spirit of God. And I pray for the health and well being of our church. My prayer and dream is that one day we might actually hit 300 per Sunday!

On another note, thank you ever so much for all your prayers and support, cards and flowers, food and gift cards over the past two weeks while Ruth Ann has been in the hospital. She may be coming home very soon (6/25...) to continue to heal and get stronger. Then we start the treatment plan for her cancer and pray for its effectiveness and her toleration of it. Again, thank you ever so much! God bless all of you!

FOR THE RECORD ...

Regrettably a member(s) took it upon themselves to mail out an anonymous letter to the congregation that attacked Pastor Krueger and inform the membership that they would be offering a motion in the August Annual Meeting for his removal from office. The letter presented many false allegations and inaccurate information that needs to be corrected "for the record."

- 1. When Pastor Krueger arrived nine years ago, Sunday attendance was 216 per Sunday, not 300. Shepherd has never had an average attendance of 300 per Sunday. Currently the average weekly attendance is 140, not 100. This general decline in attendance goes back roughly to 1996. From 1996 to 2006 average attendance declined 78 members per Sunday. From 2006 to 2014 average attendance has declined 74 members per Sunday. This is alarming and has been a high priority of the leadership of the congregation and obviously is not all Pastor Krueger's fault! For example, the sending out of this anonymous letter may well have cost Shepherd a few members already! [The average weekly attendance figures were taken from the Transforming Churches Network (TCN) report of May 2009.]
- 2. Pastor Krueger has delegated some of the calling on members primarily to Pastor Kraft. This is his primary responsibility as a part time Pastor Emeritus. He does not select a certain few to call on. And, many have remarked how well he knows the names of the membership, but it's possible that he has forgotten a name or two from time to time.
- 3. As was stated in church on June 22nd, Pastor Krueger has talked about members with others in the church, but no one has accused him of slander! Certain situations require the leaders of the church to discuss other members and actions.
- 4. Regarding the congregational meetings and Big Springs:
 - a. True, Pastor Krueger, and many others felt the January meeting was one sided and presented facts that later turned out to be inaccurate.
 - b. Yes, Pastor Krueger invited members of the School Board and the M&M Board to discuss the meeting and consider whether a follow up meeting should be called to present both sides. The group was split 50-50. Some were in favor of another meeting. Some were opposed to it.
 - c. The Board of Lay Ministry sent out a letter to the membership asking if there was an interest in calling another meeting. There was, and another meeting was called. Actually, by this time, Pastor Krueger preferred to just let it go and not meet again for fear of doing harm to the congregation. The Lay Ministers disagreed. The meeting was held and the January decision was revised to lease out two class rooms to Big Springs by over a two-thirds majority.
 - d. The votes were counted by four Lay Ministers, as recorded by the surveillance camera in the kitchen. Anybody who questions the counting of the votes by these members is, in essence, maligning them and the other members of the congregation.
 - e. The nonsense about a "loophole" to offer Big Springs office space is ridiculous! Pastor was not even at the M&M meeting where this decision was discussed and made! He was at the hospital with his wife who was having cancer surgery at that very time! There was never any remote desire to hurt the Youth program by the Board or Pastor.
- 5. The letter concludes with encouraging people to stand up and get involved in the work of the church, with our Youth program and the many boards and action teams of our church. The leadership of the congregation certainly agrees with this! Shepherd of the Valley is God's church and we are called to work together in it, in harmony with one another.
- 6. The leadership of the church had nothing to do with this letter and are appalled at this libelous and hateful attack on Pastor Krueger at a very difficult time in his life and for his family. Let us pray for the person(s) responsible for writing and mailing out this horrible letter. Let us also pray for Shepherd of the Valley, and Pastor Krueger and Ruth Ann.

Un-apologetic column 16

Peter Boghossian, the Church Whisperer Part 2

Last month I introduced you to Dr. Peter Boghossian, "The Church Whisperer". Dr. Boghossian has written a book titled "A Manual for Creating Atheists", and will soon have a T.V. show titled "The Church Whisperer". In his T.V. show, he will tape himself going into Churches to talk people out of their faith in Christ. This month I would like to take a look at the strategy he uses, and offer a defense against it should you be challenged in a similar manor.

I recently listened to a debate between Dr. Boghossian and Tim McGrew on "Unbelievable", an English podcast that features dialogues between believers and non-believers. I was hoping for a rigorous exchange on some of the professor's ideas, but to be honest, the debate never really got going. Things bogged down from the get go over the definition of the word "faith". At first I was irritated by what seemed to be tedious attention to a simple word. But as I began to think about the ramifications of accepting Dr. Boghossian definition, I realized how important it is to get our ideas properly understood from the outset.

In his book, the good doctor describes faith as "pretending to know things you don't know" or "belief without evidence". And this, he claims, is the *only* definition of the word. He claims that faith is never the right word to use outside of a religious context. You don't have "faith" that your spouse loves you. That is a properly grounded belief according to him. He also has a rather condescending view of people that use the word "faith" when discussing their religious convictions. "When I speak to somebody of faith, I view them as a person who really is mentally ill", he boasts.

You can see how quickly the deck can be stacked against you if let something as simple as the wrong definition of a word creep into your conversation. This is why it is important to actually listen to the person you are having a conversation with. Many times when we are discussing our convictions with others, it can be tempting to be planning our next line or "gotcha" moment while the other person is talking. We don't really listen to what our conversation partner is saying, and this can lead to difficulties when you are both using the same word, but each have a different definition of what is being discussed. It's always good to say something like, "I think I understand what you are saying", then repeat back to the person what you understand their position to be. If they correct you, be polite and thank them. You now have their view from their own mouth and can proceed with a correct understanding of the issue at hand.

In the case of Dr. Boghossian's view that faith is "pretending to know things you don't know" or "belief without evidence", I would follow the lead of Dr. McGrew and not accept this characterization. For instance, I would press him on how he knows things in the first place. Does he believe that the moon is made of rock rather than green cheese? If so, why? Has he been on the moon himself to confirm his belief, or is he taking the word of people who he has good reason to believe were there and accurately reported what they saw? If this is the case, how is that different from a person that trusts that the New Testament writers were accurately reporting what they saw?

As to the claim that faith is "belief without evidence", I don't know anyone that believes in God for no reason whatsoever. Even if that reason is "I've always just known" or "I just have a feeling about it". These might not be what some would consider a good reason, but they are reasons none the less. Is the fact that the universe sprung into existence from nothing (as current scientific theory supports) a good reason to think an all-powerful creative being exists outside of our universe? What about the fact that we all have certain moral concepts that seem to transcend cultures? We understand that even though in Nazi Germany the culture said it was ok to kill people of Jewish decent, there is a "law above the law" that allows us to hold people accountable actions. These seem to me to be good reasons to think that God exists and evidence of the fact that He does.

One final warning about the use of the word "evidence". Many times a non-believer will state that "extraordinary claims require extraordinary evidence". This is another claim that should not be accepted. What invariably happens in this circumstance is that no matter what evidence you give, your friend will simply say "not good enough". You need to ask the question "what will you accept as evidence?". If the bar is set at an unreasonable level (such as "I would have to see Jesus appear before me, have a scientist and psychologist on hand to be sure I was in my right mind and wasn't dreaming") you might not want to proceed. Remember, only God can open someone's heart to the gospel. We are expected to be faithful in our presentation of the truth, the rest is in the hands of the Holy Spirit. You may simply be planting a seed that will be harvested in the future when the time is right.

I hope this was of help to you. We live in a world that is growing increasingly hostile to the Christian world view. How we present ourselves and the case for our convictions will be even more crucial in the years to come. I pray we are able to continue to present the good news to a world that desperately needs it with clarity and compassion.



The Most Common Factor in Declining Churches

"Stated simply, the most common factor in declining churches is an Inward Focus."

"The ministries are only for the members. The budgetary funds are used almost exclusively to meet the needs of the members. The times of worship and worship styles are geared primarily for the members. Conflict takes place when members don't get things their way. People talk about <u>our</u> church serving <u>our</u> members.

Warning Symptoms . . . "After studying and consulting with thousands of churches, I began to see clearly this pattern. Even more, I began to recognize symptoms of an inward focus. See if you recognize a few of these."

- There are very few attempts to minister to those in the community.
- Church business meetings become arguments over preferences and desires.
- Numbers of members in the congregation are openly critical of the pastor, other church staff,
 and lay leaders in the church. "If we get new leadership everything will turn around."
- Any change necessary to become a Great Commission church is met with anger and resistance.
- The past becomes the hero. The way we've always done it is how we should be doing it now!
- Culture is seen as the enemy instead of an opportunity for believers to become salt and light.
- Pastors and other leaders in the church become discouraged. They withdraw from enthusiastic and effective leadership.
- If the churches are a part of a denomination or similar affiliation, meetings of those denominations mirror the churches in lost focus and divisiveness.
