"CHURCH MEMBERSHIP: 'What Does This Mean?' "

Happy New Year to you, Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church! As we begin this new year together, we will examine what it means to be the church of Christ and what membership in His church means. Through the first part of the Epiphany season in the month of January we will be exploring these questions each Sunday morning, culminating with the celebration of our 34th anni-

versary as a church on January 26th. I'd like to encourage every member of Shepherd of the Valley to truly make an effort to attend every one of our Sunday segments in this sermon vital series: "THE BODY."

By way of an introduction, I'd like to begin exploring these questions in a general way. What is the "Church?" In the Explanation of Luther's <u>Small Catechism</u> the church is identified in a number of ways: the visible church of God; a denomination; a local congregation; a building/house of worship. The church, or communion of saints that we speak of in the creeds refers to all believers in Christ (and only believers), that is the <u>invisible church</u>. The local congregation like Shepherd of the Valley that gathers around the Word and Sacraments and professes the Christian faith is called the <u>visible church</u>. The visible church then is made up of true believers and untrue (hypocritical) believers, sadly. As we consider the church of Christ, its mission and what it means to be a member of the church, we will be talking about true believing Christian church members.

So, what do you think it means to be a true Christian church member? Even if you can't quote chapter and verse from the Bible, what do you think God expects of the members of His church? Note, as we proceed it is not what the local visible church expects of its members. It is what God teaches us in His holy Word about membership and His will. For example, one church I know of requires that in order to be considered an active voting member, one must attend worship services more than 50% of the time. Is that what God's Word teaches? Well, one is going to be hard pressed to specifically substantiate this. But, in light of the first and third commandments, what would you believe God's will is for a true believer and follower of His? Does anyone honestly believe that it is honoring God's will for His followers to attend church on Christmas, Easter and other rare occasions? Our January sermon series is not an attempt to set up a guideline or policy of what Shepherd of the Valley says one must do to be a church member. Rather, it is a journey through God's Word and what THE GOOD SHEPHERD teaches that faithful discipleship and church membership are.

The New Testament holds up several images of what the church of God is and who its members are. To be a member of the church of the Lord means to be a member of the body of which he is the head. In Ephesians 1: 22,23, the apostle Paul identified the body as the church. He said: "And (God) has put all things under His (Jesus) feet, and gave Him to be the head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of him that fills all in all." To be a member of the church means to be a worker in the vineyard of the Lord. If you are a member of the church, you are to be a laborer, or worker in his vineyard. (Matthew 20:1). To be a member of the church is also to be a stone in the spiritual temple of God. The apostle Peter said, "You also, as living stones, are built up as a spiritual house, a holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." (I Peter 2:5). To be a member of the church means to be married to Christ, as Paul told his brothers they were "dead to the law . . . so that they should be married to another, even to Him who is raised from the dead" (Romans 7:4). It means to be a citizen in Christ's kingdom, according to Colossians 1: 12; 13, and a child in God's family, Galatians 3:26,27. In general, membership in Christ's church is about serving Him and loving others as Christ did. As Harry Wendt puts it in the *Crossways* Bible study, it is about "living now as we will live in heaven."

Membership in the church of the New Testament means the enjoyment of many rich spiritual blessings. It means that we have been called to live a life of holiness and sanctification, as those who have been justified in Christ. Membership also involves responsibilities. Since membership involves the highest and holiest privileges, it also involves some great and serious responsibilities. The idea that some seem to have, that is, that they will let others do all of the work, to build up God's kingdom here, and then that they will share in the rewards at the end of the day, is an idea that is foreign and unknown to the Scriptures. We have a duty, a calling and a responsibility. This means then that faithful members will: 1. Know, confess and remain faithful to the Holy Scriptures; 2. Avoid false teachings, religions and organizations that promote that which is contrary to God's Word; 3. Seek to promote and participate in the fellowship and the activity of the local congregation especially around the Word and Sacraments; 4. Do one's best to preserve the peace, unity and harmony of the body, the church; 5. And, as a member of the church, seek to bear fruit, and utilize one's God-given talents especially in reaching out to others with the saving Gospel.

In the end one might say that the church and membership in it is all about **relationship**. In Holy Baptism we are brought into a saving relationship with Jesus and gathered into relationship with all believers as His Body, the church. Our calling and mission as His church is to share the Good News so that others might also be brought into a saving relationship with the Lord and fellowship in His church. May God bless us in this new year as we faithfully serve and follow Him as His new creation through water and the Word, as His bride He came and sought!



There is power in naming the feelings that go with our losses or anticipated loss, but if we stop with a description of our pain, we have only done half the work. We need to come to believe in our ability to survive. We need to hope. We need to feel that there still is a future for us. If you have lost a spouse, child, family member, or a friend it is difficult to feel optimistic about tomorrow and it seems that most people do not understand the deep hurt that you feel.

The Healing with Hope Grief Survival Series at Riverside Community Hospital offers you a safe place to express how you feel with others that have lost and are experiencing the same feelings. This is what makes the Healing with Hope sessions so special, sharing with others that understand. You will have the opportunity to meet others who have experienced a recent loss, to learn their story and share your own.

You will come to realize that grief is not a disease or mental illness, but rather a natural human process filled with as much opportunity as it is with pain. Can I Get A Witness?

Well, I hope you all had a blessed Christmas! As promised, I am starting off the New Year by picking up on my series on door to door evangelists that you will encounter from other religions. I completed my series on Mormonism, and would now like to take a look at the Jehovah's Witnesses. Before we get into the nuts and bolts of the faith of the JW's, I would like to offer some personal reflections on interacting with this group.

I have to admit straight out of the gate here, this series will be a bit more academic in nature than my articles on Mormonism. I don't mean to say that I've never had personal interactions with Jehovah's Witnesses before, I have. But much to my dismay, they seem to be far less willing to engage once they encounter resistance to their ideas. I have had some very pleasant and engrossing conversations with Mormons, but not so much with the JW's. I use to think there was a problem with the tactics or methods I was using. But in discussing this problem with other Christian case makers, I have found that they have had similar experiences. JW's are quick to talk and instruct, but often turn tail and run when they are asked to defend their views. At times, it's not even your ideas that will cause them to flee, but something completely out of your control.

Cindy had an interesting encounter with the door to door evangelists here in Moreno Valley. I returned home from work one day to have her tell me the Witness's had been by. I was excited! Finally, all my training and study would be put to use! Cindy would triumphantly tell me how she had bested their arguments and brought them to the foot of the cross. They would have been overwhelmed with her articulate and grace filled defense of the gospel. "What did you say to them?" I asked. "Nothing," she replied. I was disappointed. "What do you mean?" Had she frozen up? Couldn't think of a good starting point? What had gone wrong? "They wanted to know if anyone in our house spoke Spanish, and when I said no, they left."

Sound odd? It did to me. After all, they were having this conversation in English. Why didn't they try and convert Cindy? What did speaking Spanish have to do with anything? I can't envision withholding the good news of Jesus from someone I could clearly communicate with if they were willing to talk to me. But after some reflection, an idea began to form in my mind, and it has grown in certainty with each ensuing interaction with the JW's. Their actions actually make sense on a works based theology. You see, the JW's believe evangelism is a work that will gain them good standing and glory in the afterlife (I will discuss their views on heaven in the articles to follow). In other words, it's not so much important that they actually win someone to their point of view. What was important to them was that they were out doing the work. They didn't realize the subtle message they were sending.

What was that message? We don't really care about you. We don't care what happens to you when you die. We just want to get our work done and go home. Not the demographic we're looking for? Too bad for you! This should serve as a warning to us in our own evangelistic efforts. Knowing what you believe and why you believe it is critical. But we can never forget the reason we make this effort. It's not to get a notch on our spiritual belt. It's not an attempt to help God out and get in good with the big man upstairs. If the message Jesus gave was true, and He was who he said He was, then there is much at stake. No less than the ultimate fate of our eternal souls. We need to make sure our message is presented lovingly and with genuine passion and concern for the people we are talking to. Winning the argument is not as important as winning the person.

Ok, next month I will give you some background on the Jehovah's Witnesses and some basic tenets of their faith. Until then, remain passionate in the love of Christ!



HAPPY 34TH ANNIVERSARY

On Sunday, January 26th Shepherd of the Valley will celebrate 34 years of blessings and ministry as a congregation with a rededication to serving as God's ministers/members in both worship services and a light luncheon following the 10:45am service. Through the month of January we will be focusing on what it means to be a church member and disciple of Jesus. On the last Sunday of the month we will respond with a rededication of ourselves as God's church. Then after the services we'll gather in the Fellowship Hall to celebrate our calling and enjoy a luncheon together. Please plan on joining us on Sunday, January 26th for worship and fellowship. A congregational meeting will follow the luncheon at about 1:30pm or so. More details will be coming throughout the month.

CONGREGATIONAL VOTERS' MEETING: Sunday, January 26th

Following our anniversary-discipleship celebration on the last Sunday of January there will be a voters' meeting to hear half-year **update** reports and consider a very important question. For the past four years or so we have leased out half of our school building and an office to the Big Springs School. With our Preschool completely filled the question has arisen whether it is time to discontinue leasing out this space and using it for our school operation. This is a very important decision as we consider how we will make up the loss of \$54,000 per year in lease revenue. The current lease extends through the summer to the next school year. The reason for considering this question now is to allow Big Springs time to look for a new location if the congregation decides to not re-sign a lease agreement. This is a very important matter and truly requires the careful prayer and consideration of all the members of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church. More specific information will be mailed out to members' homes in January so that everyone can pray and prepare for the meeting.
