"Mirror Mirror ...."

The average house has lots of windows and a few mirrors, right? Now, imagine a home filled with lots of mirrors, but no windows; no natural light; the occupants largely unaware of their neighbors. Instead, the homeowners spend their time looking at themselves. I don't know about you, but I'd have some serious questions about their state of mind!

Many (dare I suggest most?) churches have very few windows [of mission] into the world around them. And of the windows they do have, many don't open easily or work the way they used to work, or are obscured with dust and grime. Instead, these churches spend enormous amounts of energy, time and money looking at themselves. They may talk about windows of missions, but they get caught up in the rut of doing things the way they always have and gazing into the mirror of yesteryear and longing for the 'good old days.' Interestingly, the more energy the members invest looking in the mirrors, the less capable, confident and courageous they feel living out the extraordinary mission of God!

The life and mission of Jesus Christ was truly a window. Jesus was always focused on others and not Himself. He was sent as the promised Messiah and Savior of the world. He was the one to whom John the Baptist pointed and proclaimed "Look! Behold the Lamb of God!" John was undoubtedly looking out the window at the mission of God in the sending of His only Son into the world to rescue and redeem it from the clutches of sin and death. Likewise we also need to look and point the world to the Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ.

Mirrors have their purpose, of course. Who doesn't use a mirror every day to check out one's appearance and make sure they look presentable to the world? Interestingly, God's Law is seen as a mirror in that it reflects back to us our sinful condition and hopefully drives us to repentance and forgiveness. Whenever we look into the mirror of God's Law we reflect back an image that is totally unpresentable to God. Sadly, it might blend into the world quite well and lead us to think we're not all that bad. But it is never acceptable to God. So it serves the purpose of confronting us with our sin, and revealing our need for the Savior. It also moves us then to go to the windows and share the Good News of our Savior with others!

So, what about Shepherd of the Valley? Are we full of windows? Or, are we surrounded by mirrors? As we have been working on our Vision as a church it might be helpful to examine if that vision is looking out the windows to the mission field all around us. Or are we gazing into mirrors that reflect our vision back in on our selves? It's not easy to replace mirrors with windows. No one seems to drift naturally in this direction. Actually, our natural tendency is sinfully turned back in ourselves. Too often we might think, "Mirror, mirror on the wall, what's in it for me and us all."

God help us all to replace the mirrors in our lives and in our church with windows of love and service for others! May we say, "Mirror, mirror on the wall, God's the fairest One of all!" His will be done! May the Lord transform our lethargy into urgency, and the insulation from (the world) into an invitation! May He empower us to break the old mirrors and replace them with windows!

# **Food Myths and Facts**

# Myth: Sea salt is a low-sodium alternative.

Fact: Tests consistently show little difference in taste intensity or sodium content between varieties of sea salt and regular salt. Unfortunately, advertisements of products with sea salt have convinced the American public otherwise: In a recent survey, 61% of consumers believed sea salt was a low-sodium alternative. By weight, sea salt contains the same amount of sodium as other salts and so they have the same nutritional value.

# Myth: Heating food in a microwave destroys most of the nutrients.

Fact: The opposite is true. Foods keep more of their vitamins and nutrients because microwaves can cook food faster and without adding fat as a cooking aid.

# Myth: "Gluten-free" products are healthier alternatives, even for people who don't have celiac disease.

Fact: Unless you have celiac disease, there is no health benefit to choosing gluten-free foods. Gluten-free products still contain the same number of carbohydrates as their gluten-containing counterparts. For example, a slice of gluten-free bread contains 15 grams of total carbohydrates – the same amount as a regular slice of bread. If you want to eat healthier, cut back on all regular or gluten-free breads, cakes, cookies, crackers, pancakes, and pastas (which contain starchy and refined carbohydrates). According to Dr. Agatston, MD, ". . . the reality is that just 1 percent of the population— those suffering from celiac disease—need to be completely gluten-free."

# Myth: Honey or even brown sugar is a healthier alternative to sugar.

Fact: Chemically, honey is almost exactly like sugar, and some honey blends have more calories than regular sugar. Brown sugar is simply sugar with a little molasses added for color (without adding any nutrients). Therefore, honey, brown sugar, and sugar are essentially the same and should be a limited part of your diet. The American Heart Association recommends no more than 9.5 teaspoons per day, but most Americans consume 22 tsp./day.

# **Un-apologetic column 11**

### Can I Get A Witness?

Hello again! I hope you have all had a chance to read my January article, and are primed and ready to get some further information on the Jehovah's Witnesses. In this article, I will give a brief history of the JW's and list some of their beliefs. Next month I will offer some strategies for interacting with Jehovah's Witnesses that show up at your door. Information in this article was gathered from the book *Kingdom of the Cults,* and the Stand to Reason and Please Convince Me web sites.

The Jehovah's Witnesses were founded by a man from Pittsburgh, PA named Charles Taze Russell in 1869. Shortly after this Russell founded *The Herald of the Morning*, which has since become *The Watchtower, Announcing Jehovah's Kingdom* magazine. The publication currently boasts a circulation of 17.8 million copies monthly, and is available in 106 languages. *Awake* is the other Watchtower monthly magazine, and it has a publication run of 15.8 million copies a month. In 1917, a split occurred in the church, with the larger group following Russell's successor, J.F. Rutherford. The smaller faction became what is known today as the *Dawn Bible Students Association*.

The Jehovah's witnesses have published their own translation of the Bible, which is known as the New World Translation. The first complete version of this translation was published in 1961, and it has been carefully edited from the original text to support Watchtower doctrine. Since the time of Judge Rutherford, all Watchtower publications, including the New World Translation of the Bible, are written anonymously. The JW's claim this is to focus the attention on God's word, and to preserve the humility of the writers. Critics of this practice are quick to point out that keeping the translators anonymous makes it impossible to evaluate the qualifications of those doing the translating. When you engage Jehovah's Witnesses, you need to be aware that the Bible they are presenting you with is different than the one you own and study out of. You may hear passages that have been altered slightly from what you are familiar with. I will give a strategy to deal with this in my next column.

Starting with Charles Russell, and continuing throughout their history, the Witnesses have made hundreds of false predictions about future events. Here is just a small sampling of incorrect prophesies by the JW's starting with the year they were predicted. 1886, the Millennial Reign Has Already Begun.1897, the Millennial Reign Began in 1874. 1916, the Millennial Reign Began in 1873. 1917, Armageddon Has Begun. 1922, Jesus Will Return in 1925. 1925, Jesus May Return in 1925. 1968, Jesus Will Return in 1975. As you can see, there are some major credibility problems for our Watchtower friends where predictions are concerned.

Here are a few other quick facts about the JW's. They do not celebrate birthdays or Christmas, as they believe these are pagan practices. JW's are annihilationist's, and believe there is not hell, no eternal soul and evil people will not be punished. Jesus is not Jehovah God; he is the only directly created being that Jehovah made all things through. Christ's resurrection was spiritual, not physical. Jesus' true followers worship Jehovah God, and the Trinity does not exist. The second coming of Jesus was a spiritual awakening that occurred in 1914.

Well, that should keep your head spinning until next month (I know I could use an Advil right about now!). Until then, may God continue to richly bless you!

#### ASH WEDNESDAY and LENT

### EPIPHANY MINI-SERMON SERIES ON 1 CORINTHIANS 1 - 4

We are blessed this year with a little longer Epiphany Season because Lent and Easter fall a little later. While we can't cover the entire Book of First Corinthians, we are going to examine the first four chapters (a chapter a week) through the closing weeks of Epiphany in the month of February. Traditionally we expect during Epiphany to see Jesus revealed as the Christ through word and deed. These texts from First Corinthians, however, remind us that, surrounded by an imperfect world and as members of an imperfect visible church, we are nevertheless the lights which the living Lord Jesus wishes to use to reflect His glory in the world. One of the brightest lights is that of the unity and fellowship in the Lord. The chief reason Paul wrote this letter was to encourage unity in a congregation (Corinth) that had become divided over things which were not important. As we consider these words in the month of February, may we also be encouraged to seek out peace, unity and fellowship among us, through our Lord, Jesus Christ.
