## "20 - 17 V I S I O N!"

Most of the time we talk about "20-20" vision being the optimal quality sought and hoped for either with or without corrective lenses. So, what is "2017 Vision"? That is the vision that is being developed for the mission and ministry of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church. Why 2017, and not 2020? The year 2017 is three and a half years out which is roughly what most futurists suggest as being relevant given the rapid changes taking place today. The year 2020 will be the next step as we focus on the future desired picture of ministry of our congregation. The year 2017 also happens to be a rather important one to us Lutherans for it marks the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Luther's posting of the 95 Theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany. Many historians see that act as the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. Plans are already underway for that momentous occasion, even possibly inviting the Pope to preach at the Lutheran Church in Wittenberg! Now that would be some vision!

Getting back to "20 - 17 VISION," why is it so important to develop a vision? Isn't it just a 'wish list' of what Shepherd of the Valley would like to look like and see happening three years or so from now? To a degree, that's true! But it's not just a willy-nilly wish list of what <u>we</u> want, or what ministries we'd like to pursue in the next few years. It is a vision of what we believe the Lord is gifting and calling us to do within the context (time & place) in which we are called to serve. This involves much much more than simply saying that we want to see our Sunday morning worship attendance increase to . . . (some higher number). In fact, a truly God honoring vision focuses much farther beyond "my church," "my school," "my programs," "my campus" etc. A church of vision must shift its vision from internal to external, from program development to people development, from church-based to Kingdom based.

An easy way to get a handle on "vision" is to consider your own life. Where do you see yourself in five or ten years? Teenagers may see themselves as having graduated from high school and college and beginning a new career. Midlifers may be looking ahead to traveling, new grandchildren, and the fruitful years in their chosen profession. Seniors are, perhaps, looking at downsizing and simplifying their lives, more traveling and celebrating with their grandchildren who are getting married and graduating. While "vision" may be the new buzz-word, it really is a very old concept, but an important one.

So, where do we see Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church going in the next three years or so? Where is God equipping and leading us to go? What are the needs and opportunities for ministry in our Moreno Valley community that will open doors to share the love of Christ in word and deed? How can we best prepare ourselves and utilize our God-given resources to realize our vision? As we develop a clear vision for the next three years or so, it will generate the motivation, direction, and purpose needed to achieve it!

The Apostle Paul wrote by inspiration of the Holy Spirit, "We are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them." (Ephesians 2:10). God knows our intended vision and ministry for the future. We need to pray and seek out His will and vision. I'm sure that Martin Luther never imagined what the future held for him, even in 1517 when he challenged the practice of indulgences in the church. But as he prayed and submitted himself to the Lord's leading in the context in which he served, he became a mighty instrument in the Kingdom of God. May God enlighten our vision to see His vision, and mold our service to be His instruments and disciples in His Kingdom!

## "I stand at the door and knock .... "

A few weeks ago on one of our beautiful Saturday mornings here in Moreno Valley, there was a soft knocking on my front door. I opened the door to find a middle aged woman and her young preteen son standing on my front porch. "Hi, we'd like to talk to you about the Bible!" was her cheery greeting to me. "Great!" I replied. I had already identified her as a member of the Jehovah's Witnesses, and was quite willing to engage her in conversation. We spoke for about five minutes, and then she asked if she could come back the next week to talk some more. I agreed, and set a time for us to meet again.

I realize at this point many of you are questioning my sanity, but I think that as Christians, we often miss golden opportunities to share our convictions with others. I have heard many reasons why people choose not to share their faith. They aren't comfortable sharing in public, they are worried about violating work place rules, it's embarrassing, it never seems a good time, I wouldn't know what to say, what if they ask me something I don't know the answer to, and many others. But consider this for a moment. All people need to hear the Gospel, and here are people showing up at your front door wanting to talk about religion of all things! You can witness without leaving the comfort of your own home. And if things don't go well for you, you can easily escape back into your house!

There are basically two categories of people who show up on your doorstep. Many are from other Christian denominations simply inviting you to try out their church. I have chatted with many of these people, and as soon as they find out I already attend a Christian church, they graciously thank me for my time and leave, usually saying something along the lines of "we are not trying to take you away from your home church." The reason for this is simple. While we might differ on secondary theological issues with other Christian denominations, we recognize that in the essentials of Christian doctrine, we agree with one another.

Members of the second category, however, will not leave when you tell them you are a Christian. The two most common groups in this category are the Mormons and the Jehovah's Witnesses. They will continue to witness to you, because they believe that you cannot be saved without being a member of their organization. This is not my opinion; they will freely offer this up to you if you ask them "Can I be saved if I am not a Mormon/Jehovah's Witness"? While these groups may make the claim they are Christian, their own teachings deny that central claim of classical Christianity, that Christ's sacrifice on the cross is sufficient for salvation. In their view, it is Christ + works, as opposed to Christ + nothing that is needed for salvation.

Next month I will offer some general advice and strategies to have productive conversations with people that come to your door. In the months after that, I will focus on the two groups I have mentioned, the Mormons and the Jehovah's witnesses. We will learn about their theology from their own teachings and literature, and how best to approach conversations with each group. Until then, if someone knocks on your door, don't be afraid to have a conversation! As the Christian philosopher Greg Koukl says, "You don't have to hit home runs every time out, just get up to bat!

### "A MATTER OF LIFE AND DEATH!"

When I underwent a training program to be a paramedic, many years ago, one of the clinical requirements was to spend a prescribed number of hours observing autopsies. While it took some getting used to (especially the smell), it was a really great learning experience. In fact, one of the primary reasons for conducting autopsies is not merely to determine the cause of death, but to uncover how to avoid death and promote/support life! So, when I read an article by a well known and respected church consultant in which he reported the findings of an autopsy he conducted on a church he'd worked with ten years earlier, it caught my attention. He writes, "I took no pleasure in discovering that not only was my diagnosis correct, I had mostly gotten right all the signs of the impending death of the church. I reviewed the past ten years and was able to piece together a fairly accurate autopsy. Here are things I learned."

<u>The church had no community-focused ministries and was not interested in its neighborhood.</u> There was no attempt to reach out to the community. The congregation was inwardly focused on their needs, wants and desires. The community began a transition toward a lower socioeconomic class thirty years ago, but the church members had no desire to reach the new residents. The congregation thus became an island of middle-class members in a sea of lower-class residents.

<u>Members became more focused on memorials.</u> Do not hear my statement as a criticism of memorials. Indeed, I recently funded a memorial in memory of my late grandson. The memorials at the church were chairs, tables, rooms, and other places where a neat plaque could be placed. The point is that the memorials became an obsession at the church. More and more emphasis was placed on the past.

<u>The percentage of the budget for members' needs kept increasing.</u> At the church's death, the percentage was over 98 percent! There was almost no support for missions, evangelism, or helping those outside the church.

<u>The members had more and more arguments about what they wanted.</u> As the church continued to decline toward death, the inward focus of the members turned caustic. Arguments were more frequent; business meetings became more acrimonious. Members were divided on turf and agenda issues!

<u>With few exceptions, pastoral tenure grew shorter and shorter.</u> The church had seven pastors in its final ten years. The last three pastors were bi-vocational. All of the seven pastors left discouraged.

<u>The church rarely prayed together.</u> In its last eight years, the only time of corporate prayer was a three-minute period in the Sunday worship service. Prayers were always limited to members, their friends and families, and their physical needs. Although they preached from the Bible and studied God's Word, they didn't absorb it and live it!

<u>The church had no clarity as to why it existed.</u> There was no vision, no mission, and no purpose. Most reminisced about the past years and wanted to get back to the way things had always been done! The members idolized another era. They saw their future to be returning to the past.

<u>The facilities continued to deteriorate.</u> It wasn't really a financial issue. Instead, the members failed to see the continuous deterioration of the church building. Simply stated, they no longer had "outsider eyes." They became accustomed to the way things were and not what they should/could be.

Though this story is bleak and discouraging, we must learn from such examples. It is estimated that as many as 100,000 churches in America of all kinds of denominations could be characterized with many of the same symptoms as stated above, and dying. Sadly, Shepherd of the Valley exhibits some of these characteristics. But it is certainly not too late! Pray for God's Spirit, wisdom and guidance that we 'learn and live!'
