THE REFORMATION – OUR REFORMATION?

If anyone should know what the Reformation was all about it should be us Lutherans, right? Hmm? I suspect it's one of those things everybody's heard of but few really quite understands. Many might say it was when Dr. Martin Luther (not 'King') took on the Pope and the Church of Rome over the selling of indulgences. And that would be right, but very one dimensional and quite simplistic! The Reformation was the culmination of centuries of corruption in the church and among the clergy and the consequence of a European power vacuum. I have pondered where I (we) might "stand" if the Reformation occurred today. The Reformation rocked the Roman Empire and the church in a way we probably cannot truly understand.


The story really began over a hundred years earlier, when the Papacy began to reap the effects of centuries of compromise. The Great Schism saw two, even three individuals claiming to be the Pope, and the Council of Constance in the early fifteenth century saw a power struggle between Bishops and Pope. Combined, they hindered Papal government and harmed the reputation of the Church in the eyes of the laity. The church carried on unabashed and proud, selling offices and indulgences, a political plaything for princes and a useful source of income. Many priests became wealthy performing multiple masses day after day, holding out the hope of reducing loved ones' time in purgatory. The very same church where the 95 theses were posted was conducting some 9000 masses a year (24-25/day) most often times at the expense of poor and starving peasants. Consider that fact alone when Martin Luther comes along and says that one is saved freely by the grace of God. No more indulgences needed to be purchased! No more masses had to be paid for! This had a huge impact on the church that was reaping great sums of money selling forgiveness and eternity.

It was a depressed German cleric, Martin Luther, who lit the fuse for the first, European, Reformation. Provided no comfort by Catholic ritual and horrified by abuses in Italy, he concluded that salvation was a personal matter between God and man: traditional church ceremony was irrelevant at best and at its worst - the sale of indulgences, for example - fraudulent! Nailing his 95 Theses to a church door in Wittenberg, Germany, prompted massive theological debate and he was condemned as a heretic and an outlaw. Luther's ideas were white hot and they spread fast. Of course with the invention of the printing press and moveable type (the internet of the day) these challenges and ideas spread far and wide. Given the power vacuum of the day, these challenges to one of the great power brokers sent tremors throughout Europe and England.

While all of this may be interesting, we still might wonder why the Reformation was so important. True, it happened a long time ago in a galaxy far, far away, but it established in Europe and England a major paradigm shift in religion, economics and politics. This is why the secular world also studies and concludes that the Reformation was one of the great pivotal points in history. Of course in the Lutheran Church we also remember and celebrate Luther's allegiance and submission to the Word of God. It was that Word that drove him to turn the whole world upside down and take his "stand" upon it! Maybe we need another Martin Luther today! (I wonder if the Pope today might be a reformer of sorts? He is turning some things upside down!) But, if God blessed us with another Martin Luther, I wonder if we would be willing to see our world turned upside down and support serious and significant changes in order to follow him.

Let us celebrate the Reformation by renewing our hunger for the Word of God, our reliance on the mercy and grace of God revealed in it and our commitment to follow God's will set forth in it! Our God is "a mighty fortress Whose Word still remains." The Lord is still "by our side with His good gifts and Spirit." And, whatever may come our way in this life, "our victory has been won, and the kingdom ours remaineth!"





The contestants we battle, however, are frequently ourselves, our circumstances, and struggles we wage against the powers of darkness in this fallen world. While our personal scorecard may reveal a lackluster performance, God wants each of us to take the ultimate prize -- the crown of life -- already won for us by Jesus Christ. This month's session is "Exceeding Expectations" and points to examples of people and teams that accomplished more than expected. We hope that you will join us and bring a friend.

Who Is God, And What Is The Gospel?

Last month we discussed some basic Mormon theology, and how it differs in key areas from classical Christianity. Now that we have some knowledge under our belts, let's get together a game plan for discussing our convictions with our new Mormon friend. Using our knowledge of LDS teachings, we can make our case for the nature of God, and how we are saved. I will also prepare you for the queen mother of all Mormon missionary tactics, the personal testimony, or "The Burning in the Bosom" as it is commonly referred to among Mormons.

One quick word before we begin. Do not expect that these tactics will immediately convince a LDS member to abandon the Mormon Church. There are many factors outside of the theological reasons for a Mormon to remain in the faith, even if they come to the belief that they are in error. They stand to lose their family, friends and in many cases their employment if they work for a company run by other LDS members. This is a big decision, and a monumental shift in worldview and lifestyle. We must be kind and understanding, yet firm in Christ's message of salvation.

When focusing on the question "Who is God," we should try to get a specific answer from our Mormon friends. As I pointed out last month, Mormons use the same words as Christians, but mean different things. If a missionary tells you they believe in Jesus, ask "What is your view of who Jesus was?" Use scripture to back up your position that Jesus, the Holy Spirit and the Father are one, and that the triune God is the only god. Point them to scriptures such as Deuteronomy 6:4, Isaiah 43:10 and 44:6-8, Mark 12:29, and John 17:3. Mormons will agree scripture states there is only one God, but then qualify that by saying he is the only God of "This World." But is that what scripture says? In the book of Isaiah, God does not claim He is the only God of this world. He proclaims, "I am God, and there is none else" (Isaiah 45:22). John 1:1 says, "In the beginning was the Word (Jesus), and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." In John 10:30, Jesus says, "I and my Father are one," clearly understood to be a claim to deity. The Apostle Paul echoes this view of Jesus in Philippians 2:5-8. Passages like Matthew 28:19 support this conclusion, as Jesus commands us to baptize in the "name," not names, of the "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit." Ironically, support for the Trinity can also be found in the Book of Mormon, in passages like Alma 11:26-29, Alma 11:44, and Mosiah 15:1-4.

"Gospel," as we all know, means "good news." What is this good news? It's forgiveness of sins through the atoning sacrifice of Jesus (Matthew 26:28, I Peter 2:24). It's reconciliation to God through the work of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:18-20). It's new life through the resurrection of Christ (Romans 6:4, Galatians 2:20). All this Christ did "that He might bring us to God" (I Peter 3:18). The Gospel is the greatest news the world has ever known. According to the LDS scriptures however, individual salvation is only achieved through perfect obedience. But as we know, perfection is impossible. This has caused one commentator to dub the Mormon gospel as an "Impossible Gospel." Preaching a false gospel is a grave offense and the consequences match it in severity (Galatians 1:6-10). Point them to Titus 3:5-7 to show that we are not captive to a works-based salvation. Lead them to verses such as Romans 4:1-8, Ephesians 2:8-9, and Hebrews 10:10-14. Let the true nature of grace and mercy that is spoken of in these passages be a light to them, and allow the Holy Spirit to work in their hearts and minds.

At some point in your conversation, once you have presented your argument, you are likely to hear the following statement. "I have read the Book of Mormon from cover-to cover. I testify to you that I know the Book of Mormon is true. I know that Joseph Smith was a true prophet of God. And I know the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is true." Personal testimony is a crucial part of Mormon witnessing. But in light of what we have set before them, does personal testimony outweigh evidence? I ask the following question of my new friends to prove my point on this matter. Suppose I go into my bank and ask the teller for \$5000. The teller looks up my account and says "I'm sorry Mr. Covert, you only have \$7.58 in your account." I reply to her "I have prayed about this, and I know I have \$5000 in my account." Should the teller trust the evidence before her, or my personal feelings on the matter? You might also ask "Have your feelings ever lead you astray?" I know that mine have on many occasions. Feelings are not a good reason to ignore the evidence before us in God's Word.

I hope these tips will help you get started in your conversations. This is by no means an all-encompassing treatment on the subject, but should help you hold your own in a conversation. For deeper study of the issue, I recommend the books "The Maze of Mormonism" by Walter Martin, or "Mormonism, an Ambassadors Guide" by Brett Kunkle, the latter of which proved helpful in writing this article. I will pick up this series again in January with tips on dialoguing with Jehovah's Witnesses, but would like to take the next two months to discuss some different issues. See you next month!
